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## HOUSING THREAT TO NATURE NETWORK

Sir, The government's policy for a nature recovery network, published last October as part of its 25-year environment plan, committed it to creating a connected network of places across England that are richer in wildlife, more resilient to climate change, and provide wider benefits, including carbon capture. Housing policy has not caught up with this commitment, with councils considering development on sites that will be key to nature networks.

In West Sussex, 3,500 houses are being proposed next to the Knepp rewilding project, an outstanding example of habitat restoration hosting some of the country's most threatened species, and a site under consideration to become a National Nature Reserve and, potentially, the beating heart of one of Natural England's new nature recovery areas. The development would stop nature in its tracks, preventing the Knepp estate from connecting with St Leonard's Forest and Ashdown Forest, reducing it to a wildlife island in a sea of housing, allocated by central government.

We appreciate the need for more homes to meet housing requirements but urge the government to honour its pledge to build "the right homes in the right places".

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
