Plant your Postcode News

It has been an exciting start to the year for CPRE Sussex as we continue to increase urban tree cover. Forgotten Places and Plant Your Postcode events have seen lots of new trees planted across Brighton & Hove.

Forgotten Places: Greening Coastal Towns & Cities

We have been working flat out with Brighton & Hove City Council's Arboriculture Team to plant all 102 of our trees as part of this exciting project.

Community planting events have taken place in Bevendean, Woodingdean, Portslade and on the Bristol Estate.

The **Bristol Estate** planting was hosted by BELTA to support The Queen's Green Canopy Project.

Juliet Smith, The Queen's Deputy Lord Lieutenant, opened the day where Trees for Cities and Connick Tree Care staff supported the planting of a beautiful hawthorn and a hornbeam – two of 12 trees being planted on the estate.

Other trees include stone pine, elm, callery pear and a stunning honey locust.

Ben D'Montigny from BELTA said: "It was a really positive day for residents and various groups to get together to participate in our ceremonial tree planting event."

Bevendean was the location for an ambitious tree planting session with corporate sponsors Metlife.

They put their best digging foot forward, not only funding 18 trees but also sending six staff to plant 12 trees in one day, stirlingly supported by Mark Gappa from BHCC.

Redwoods, birch and aspens were planted as part of a majestic scheme devised by Penny Hudd from CPRE Sussex.

"We are not just doing this because trees are lovely and picturesque," said Penny. "They also have an important role to play in the local ecosystem and helping to ensure our city is a healthier place for everyone to live."



Following a tree planting session in **Woodingdean** with Jenni Cresswell (CPRE Sussex) and Ben Galley (BHCC) with the Woodingdean Wilderness Group, local residents are now the proud custodians of 46 trees including pears, crepe myrtle, stone pine and alders.

During a sunny day at the end of March, another community event in **Portslade** saw the last two trees, of the 19 planted in the area go into the ground. Among the volunteers was 92-year-old Audrey Bromley who helped to plant trees opposite her home of more than 70 years.

Audrey's daughter Sharon Dowds said: "I was as proud as my mum to know and see that people do care about the local environment and we felt privileged to be a small part of that."

The Forgotten Places project was based on a successful bid by CPRE Sussex's Plant your Postcode volunteers, supported by Brighton & Hove City Council's Arboriculture team and Hove Civic Society.

Plant Your Postcode

At the start of the year **Hanover Action Group** came together with Plant Your Postcode volunteers to celebrate the planting of three new trees in Elm Grove.

The large turkish hazel saplings were planted in memory of Neil Smith to replace elms lost to disease.

Meanwhile, in **Wilbury Avenue**, residents were thrilled to have their lost elm tree replaced in expert fashion by BHCC contractors.

Resident Julia Wolage said: "We are very happy and hope the re-greening of Hove continues with gusto."

Waitrose stores in Brighton and Hove have also donated the beautiful Japanese Pagoda tree planted in **Palmeira Square** and the lovely sycamore in **Hove Park** by the playground.

The final planting of a project in **Surrenden Road** was completed on 16 March when volunteers from **Seed Digital Marketing Agency** joined local residents to plant 100 native tree species whips.

The bank of planting includes yew, holly, hawthorn, blackthorn, hazel, rowan and cherry.

It complements the replacement planting of nine stately trees including beech, disease resistant elm and stone pines.

The community raised funds for the trees supported by CPRE Sussex's Plant Your Postcode project.

BHCC tree planting officer Ben Galley said: "This woodland planting style with mixed species is good for biodiversity, provides a nature corridor and creates a shelter belt, whilst also covering an ugly fence and replacing recently lost mature elms."

Resident Rachel Lock said "The scheme is really great as we've missed the elm trees; the wind really whistles up the road and they looked beautiful, so it will be really lovely to have some fresh greenery back."

Plans for an ambitious planting scheme in **Glebe Villas** has also reached fruition.

Residents have worked long and hard raising funds and uniting over planting plans and funds donated by local people, plus additions from CPRE Sussex, Hove Civic Society and the BHCC Councillor Budget scheme.

Supporter Lara Rix-Paradinas said: "It's been three years getting trees planted on Glebe Villas. Finally with the help of CPRE and Hove Civic Society we are proud to say we have given a gift to the future of Glebe Villas and the wider community. These trees will outlive us and be a towering achievement for a community coming together."

Tree training courses

Forgotten Places partner organisation the Field Studies Council produced a Tree ID Guide with input from experts in Brighton and will produce two more before the year is out.

The guide was sent to 13,065 people. Brighton residents ordered the highest number out of all seven participating locations across the UK.

Alongside the printed guides, the Field Studies Council is also running three Tree ID training courses throughout the year.

Surveying

Over the summer the plan is to start to survey the streets that you, as residents, have identified to find out where planting is possible.

We will then begin to estimate costs and decide which species of trees would suit the local environment, keeping you informed and engaged with the process as best we can.

Ash Woodland

Sadly ash dieback has taken a serious toll on woodland in and around the City as trees have sickened and become dangerous. The Arboriculture Team have been clearing hundreds of diseased trees this year. Work has begun on planning how best to tackle woodland restoration to prevent the possibility of another monoculture with one species taking over as ash did after the great storm felled over 15 million trees across the country in 1987.
